CLEAN SLATE

Designer Eva Quateman helped longtime clients make their Streeterville pied-à-terre into a welcoming home.

Tim and Mary Ann Keneally have lived in about 20 different places in many cities over the course of their 50-year marriage. A 6,000-square-foot residence on the Jersey Shore seemed the perfect hub for the retired executive and hospice nurse, with their five grown kids and 11 grandchildren. But their love for Chicago keeps bringing the former New Yorkers home.

Tim, now a consultant, found the perfect condo in a 1986-built Streeterville high-rise. "It's a gracious layout," says designer Eva Quateman (evaquateman.com), who met the couple when she sold her condo to them years before, and then helped them furnish it. "There's a nice foyer, 9-foot ceilings, spacious rooms, and amazing lake and south architectural views."

The apartment needed updating, which allowed the kitchen and baths to become part of a cohesive design plan. "Mary Ann wanted something 100% new, with no hints of previous apartments and homes," says Quateman. The designer shopped antiques and sites like chairish.com for furniture that could be customized and lend personality. The result is a comfortable blend of midcenturymodern, Regency, CONTINUED...

...continued French, art deco and '40s-style pieces, as well as some from Quateman's own Essentials collection.

To create a consistent backdrop throughout, Quateman went with her go-to nuanced white paints: Benjamin Moore's Ballet White and Maritime. "I like whites that don't have yellow in them," she says. A mostly black, white and beige palette springs to life with the use of pattern (from animal prints to modern toiles), texture (tweeds, wovens and leather) and punches of Chinese red, most prominent in a pair of gilt-accented cabinets in the living room.

A handpainted faux snakeskin console sets a chic tone in the foyer, with its engaging form, a riff on a waterfall table. Pattern gets bolder in the living and dining area, where a leopard-patterned rug grounds all but a 12-inch border around the 30-foot-by-18-foot room. The rug visually unifies the space, making it live even larger. "I like animal prints with everything, but I had to convince Mary Ann," says Quateman, who also teamed an overscale toile fabric on low-backed chairs with subtle striping on the flanking skirted armchairs. Anchoring the seating is a classic '70s-style brass framed cocktail table.

Gold is a consistent finish throughout. "I love everything about gold," says Quateman, who appreciates the glam, dressed-up touch it lends—from a modern, spiky Kelly Wearstler chandelier to a midcentury bronze sculpture in the dining room.
